Subject: Romsey Avenue development - objection

Land to the south of Romsey Ave

I write to you as a resident of Romsey Avenue who backs immediately onto the field.

I am also a father of a child who attends Wicor school.

I frequently see deer in the field, and other wildlife including geese (Brent I believe although I am no expert).

I remain confused as to Foreman homes claim on their website under their ethos:

'We are committed to providing good quality, affordable homes for our customers through responsible development, dedicated to the improvement of the local infrastructure, respect for the environment and commitment to high levels of customer care.'

'Respect for the environment' is highly questionable when considering the devastation of such a greenfield site and agricultural land.

Some observations:

The adjacent field floods significantly in heavy rain.

The traffic during school time, narrow access routes, cause congestion, backlogs, and enhanced risk for children walking and cycling to and from school.

The transport infrastructure - current or proposed - will not cope with such a development.

The noise impact on residents for the duration of such a development will have a significant detrimental impact on wellbeing and quality of life of residents.

The local infrastructure simply won't cope with a development of this scale - schools, Drs etc. Therefore Foreman homes will actually risk putting massive increased pressure on the local infrastructure.

Frankly, with brownfield sites screaming out for ethical development I truly struggle to understand the proposal to destroy such a beautiful area of land which will change the face of the area for ever.

I hope that my observations will have some bearing on helping influence the rejection of this development application.

I strongly object.
