- 5. Natural England have been consistent with their objections

Agent of Change para 187 NPPF 2021

- Planning policies and decisions should ensure that new development can be integrated effectively with existing businesses and community facilities (including sports clubs). They should not have unreasonable restrictions placed on them as a result of new development.
- The 'agent of change should be required to provide suitable mitigation where an existing facility could have a significant adverse effect on new development

- 1.2.12 Predicted noise table results **not experience of any resident.**
- 1.3.1 Live & recorded music until midnight. Temporary license option used to extend hours

AFC Portchester - community

- Additional income from social hire essential for club survival
